Township Standing on a Solid Foundation



The Board of Trustees of Miami Township recently accepted Township Administrator Jeff Wright's resignation to serve in another community. The Board thanks Jeff for his service and wishes him well in his new position.

As a Township, we have worked hard to create an environment to foster and support talented entrepreneurs and small business owners so they can thrive in Miami Township. The relationships created with small business owners who give back so much to our community are priceless and not taken for granted. This support will continue going forward.

With the Township largely built out, we have become diligent and creative in partnering with the development community to bring new retail to sites that have challenges due to topography or other issues. One very visible example is the new Aldi location and restaurant outlot under construction on SR 28. This project will also improve vehicular access and safety to adjacent properties. We look forward to seeing the successful completion of a new light industrial park on US 50 at Wolfpen-Pleasant Hill Road that the Township has supported with the developers at Henkle Schueler & Associates. We have also been successful in the redevelopment or 'repurposing' of existing commercial and office space to fill them with thriving businesses. We are proud of how we have worked with regional and state partners to complete job creation projects of large-scale economic proportions for projects to bring Satco Inc. to Wards Corner Road, and to relocate the world headquarters for Cold Jet at its new location on TriRidge Boulevard. Commitment to partnerships and finding creative ways to attract business and development to Miami Township will not change.

Other accomplishments include improving pedestrian connectivity. We have completed sidewalk projects on Wolfpen, Buckwheat, Mt. Zion and Cook Roads, Business 28 and near Miami Meadows Park. This benefits many residents and businesses by connecting schools, parks, neighborhoods, and the central business district. We have successfully competed for over \$2 million in grants for a variety of park and infrastructure improvements, some of which was spent on those sidewalk connectivity projects. Other grant funds were spent completing the Spirit of '76 Park with resident volunteers and veterans. Connectivity for our residents and visitors remains a priority.

Perhaps the thing to be most proud of is that by being intentional, and remembering that the community always deserves our best, we continue to attract, develop, and retain a strong team of public servants who are dedicated to serving our residents and businesses. We have developed a wonderful team of colleagues serving Miami Township.

Be Prepared for Winter Driving

Are you ready to drive this winter? Snow and ice covered roads can be frightening and dangerous. By preparing before you travel, you can improve your chances of arriving safely at your destination this winter.

The Miami Township Police Department recommends these tips before you take to the roads this season:

- * Make sure your battery and cooling system are in good working order. Make sure tires are properly inflated and have plenty of tread.
- * Check your wiper fluid and wiper blades. If you are using your wipers, make sure your headlights are on as well.
- * Keep your gas tank at least half full. This reduces the chance of gas line freeze up.
- * Keep your windows and mirrors clear of snow and ice.
- * In cold weather, you may want to warm up your vehicle before you drive. Be aware of carbon monoxide poisoning!

 NEVER leave your vehicle running in an enclosed area, such as a garage.
- * Keep a winter supply box with water, jumper cables, a flashlight, ice scraper, road flares, cell phone charger, and blankets in your vehicle. Having these items ensure you can stay safe if the worst happens.
- Pay attention to weather reports. The best advice for driving in bad weather is not to drive at all if you can avoid it. Consider delaying the trip. If you have to travel, then be sure you share your route, destination, and estimated time of arrival with someone before you leave.

Lastly, drivers should be aware of rules for dealing with snow emergencies. Ohio Revised Code Section 505.17(A) provides the Board of Trustees of Miami Township with the authority to adopt a general snow emergency authorization and limit or prohibit parking on any Township street or road during a snow emergency. In accordance with Miami Township Resolution #2016-64, the Township may declare the following snow emergencies:

Level 1: Roadways are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow. Roads may also be icy. Motorists are urged to drive very cautiously.

<u>Level 2</u>: Roadways are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow. Roads may also be very icy. Only those who feel it necessary to drive should be out on the roads. Contact your employer to see if you should report to work. Motorists should use extreme caution.

Level 3: All roadways are closed to non-emergency personnel. No one should be driving during those conditions unless it is absolutely necessary to travel, or a personal emergency exists. All employees should contact their employer to see if they should report to work. Those traveling on the roads may subject themselves to arrest. Any order issued in accordance with this authorization shall become effective two (2) hours after an announcement has been made to the local news media.

Police Association Making a Difference

Being President of the Miami Township Police Association is one of my favorite duties. The vast majority of our police officers and clerks are active members who voluntarily donate money to our charitable organization to help make a difference in our community. When we started the association 15 years ago, I could not envision how great of an impact we could have.

Being the DARE officer for the community means that I organize our annual Shop with a Cop program which is the biggest charitable event that our association sponsors. We raise donations from local businesses and residents so that we can invite about 150 local kids in need to come shopping with us. Each child can spend up to around \$200 on gifts for their

family. Seeing the joy on their faces makes all of the hard work worthwhile. We also purchase about 60 new child-sized coats to give away at this event.

The association keeps dozens of child sized bike helmets at the police station to give away, so no kid needs to ride a bike or skateboard unprotected. We distribute a lot of Christmas turkey dinners and pass out thousands of dollars in gift cards each year in our White Envelope Program.

The MTPA donates money to many deserving local charities, like Reset 360, Feed Our Flock, Cancer Free KIDS, the Loveland food pantry, CASA Court Appointed Special Advocates, Women's Shelters, Kenzie's Closet (provide hygiene products for under-privileged), Matt Haverkamp Foundation (funding police canines), Clermont to the Rescue Humane Society (animal shelter), St. Vincent de Paul, Clermont County Toy Chest, Matthews Ministry, and MTPD's Citizen's Police Academy Alumni Association. We also encourage and sponsor our officers to participate in many charitable events such as 5Ks and golf outings benefitting other worthy causes, thus making a more widespread impact.

Occasionally, tragedy may strike a local family and we have been able to step in and "adopt" local families in need who have had a breadwinner die unexpectedly, a house fire, or a medical emergency that has had tragic consequences. In these dire circumstances, sometimes we can assist with food insecurity, household items, clothing and other basic necessities.

Besides all of the local charities or needy families we help throughout the year, the Miami Township Police Association also awards college scholarships to deserving graduating seniors from Milford and Loveland High Schools, to qualifying Miami Township Public Safety Cadets, and to dependents of police officers. Last year we awarded eight scholarships in total!

Clearly the limiting factor is how much money we can raise. The Miami Township Police Association is a 501(c)3 public charity so donations are tax deductible per IRS regulations. If you would like to donate to the great cause there are two ways in which to do so. First you can drop off or mail a check to the Miami Township Police Department at 5900 McPicken Drive, Milford Ohio 45150. Make checks payable to Miami Township Police Association. GARY KNEPP'S SERIES

HENRY CLARK CORBIN

Henry Clark Corbin is hardly a household name today. But in the years following the Spanish American War, he was a wellknown Washington, D.C. power broker. Articles about his public and personal activities appeared in newspapers around the world. As a young man from Monroe Township, he served during the Civil War and despite two court-martial attempts, left the Army with the rank of Brev. Brig. General. He accepted a commission in the Regular Army personally offered to him by Gen. Ulysses Grant and thus began the remarkable career of a man who became a friend and confidant of presidents and foreign leaders alike. Historian Gary Knepp, who published the general's autobiography, will lead this class, and will share photographs of this intriguing man. While Fire Safety and Personal Safety are paramount to preventing an emergency from occurring, unfortunately, sometimes prevention is unsuccessful. When an emergency happens, our professionals are a 911 call away. We will respond and work with our partners to remedy whatever problems have arisen. Miami Township Fire & EMS is here to help with emergencies such as Structure Fires, Medical Calls, Traffic Accidents, Gas Leaks, Carbon Monoxide presence and more. After our response, a prepared home or business will be best positioned to bounce back after the emergency.

When the initial hazards or health problems have been managed, recovery from the incident starts. It is important to set you and your loved ones up to be resilient, so your recovery phase is effective

Having the following in place will ensure care is thorough and as quick as possible. These safety tips can help prevent injuries as well.

For traffic accidents:

- Always wear your seatbelt when in a vehicle.
- Limit loose items in a vehicle to prevent them from being projectiles in an accident.
- Stay off mobile devices while driving. In Ohio, it is illegal to use or hold a cell phone or electronic device in your hand, lap, or other parts of the body while driving on Ohio roads.
- Have a paper copy of your insurance card available for law enforcement.

For medical emergencies:

- Medication and Allergy Lists, including the patient's name, date of birth, and the date it was last updated.
- State of Ohio Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) Orders where appropriate. Paramedics and EMTs need the State of Ohio form that is completed by a physician, Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN), or physician assistant (PA). Talk to your primary care or specialist provider about these.
 - o The form is one page and includes the DNRCC and DNRCC-Arrest choices, the DNR Protocol, and information regarding the protections provided to health care providers, and instructions.
- Maintain a clear path in a home for the emergency workers to enter with a stretcher.

In case of a fire, the following preparations will aid in the recovery process:

- Review all fire safety recommendations, especially smoke and carbon monoxide detector needs.
- Memorize or place in a safe place a list of the most important phone numbers, such as family and friends.
- Review your insurance to ensure it meets your expectations.
- Place a copy of important documents in a secure location, such as a safe deposit box.
- Backup electronic information such as pictures, phone numbers, and contact information to a secure location.
- Place a vehicle key in a separate location to allow access to unharmed vehicles after a structure fire.

Why do Townships Assign Address Numbers?

Most would think the United States Postal Service ("USPS") would have something to do with it. Actually, in Clermont County, the USPS looks to individual Townships to analyze and establish address numbers. In 1991 as parts of Clermont County were continuing

to become more urban, the Clermont County Board of Commissioners adopted Resolution 66-91. Under the authority of Ohio Revised Code ("ORC") Section 303.021, that resolution provides authorization to establish a, "uniform plan of

property numbering," i.e., an address system, and the County concurrently adopted an address grid map that had previously been in use by the Regional Planning Commission, providing an address overlay for the entire County. Today, that same grid roughly establishes the address range, depending on where the location is within the County. Although ORC Section 303.021 vests authority



at the County level to issue addresses, uniquely in Clermont County we see that responsibility having been delegated to the various Townships. In Miami Township, once an address is established by Community Development Department staff, it is distributed to a variety of agencies you might expect, such as "911", the Clermont County Auditor, and of course, the United States Postal Service.

Aldi Status Update & Access

The Miami Township Aldi is now under construction. Recently, we assigned a new address for the Location, using the new public street to be constructed, Lorven Drive. The store's new address will be 5959 Lorven Drive. This will make it easy to find rather than using a State Route 28 locator. In addition, we are advised that the outlot in the front of the store has interest from a coffee shop – we're waiting to get more details on that. If that project comes through, it will be a nice complimentary user to Aldi. The developer advises that the estimated opening date for Aldi is not yet determined, but that the project is

ahead of schedule and that actual building construction is anticipated to start very soon. Once the building is under construction, a more accurate estimate can be determined, but nonetheless opening is in sight!

An equally important part of the project not to be overlooked is that the new Lorven Drive will connect over into the Al Gore Acres subdivision, directly east of the Aldi site. With that connection, subdivision residents will now have a new and much safer way to enter onto State Route 28 via signalized intersection. This new road is a great added benefit to the development.

Maximizing Snow & Ice Treatments Using Additives

The Miami Township Service Department uses various tactics to reduce waste and treat streets for snow and ice. Road crews mix a solution composed of tap water and road salt, that when sprayed on traditional road salt, will make it stick to the pavement better and activate on contact. The addition of the salt brine process for winter weather events is a cost-saving measure that enhances the Township's ability to help keep streets clear in the winter, while conserving the salt stockpile for more major storm events. The Township maintains its own brine making equipment.

PROCESS - Above 20 Degrees

The strategy is to keep road salt from hitting the pavement and simply bouncing into the grass. When temperatures are above 20 degrees, the salt brine will be mixed with the salt inside the auger of the truck or sprayed onto the salt at the spinner before it's spread onto the road. This

helps keep the salt on the treated areas and helps reduce the overall salt application.

ICE B'GONE MAGIC LIQUID - Under 20 Degrees

Salt Brine is most useful for treating roads when the temperature reaches at least 20 degrees. Temperatures below this threshold require a much different solution. In the past, calcium chloride was the only treatment, which caused harm to plants and increased the corrosion rate for roads and sidewalks. There is now a much safer, more effective de-icing treatment solution called "Ice B'Gone Magic Liquid" which Miami Township road crews use in a mix of 80% salt brine with 20% Ice B'Gone.

IBG Magic Liquid is a highly effective liquid de-icing agent made from a patented blend of magnesium chloride combined with an agricultural by-product of the distilling process (i.e. grain and/or sugar based). The formula is non-toxic, bio-degradable and has a corrosion index lower than distilled water. IBG Magic Liquid can be sprayed onto regular

ADVANTAGES

Using brine/IBG Magic Liquid for prewetting:

- Rock salt can be spread more uniformly and less is wasted on shoulders and ditches. This reduces the impact to the environment.
- Materials adhere to the surface because the salt & brine mixture has a thicker consistency. The slurry-like mixture tends to "plop" onto the roadway and better stay where it lands.

- Melting begins faster since a liquid has been introduced to the salt. (Salt must find moisture before it can begin to work).
- Roads are safer sooner Spreading speeds can be increased because more material stays on the roadway.
- Since the brine begins working and diluting as it hits the surface, it will dry much more rapidly, returning the roadway to normal winter driving conditions much sooner.
- Residual salt may remain on the road that will immediately begin working with the next storm.
- When dry materials are pre-wet with brine, the application rate can be cut back because more of the material remains on the roadway. In addition, the additional brine adds some quick melting action.
